

Neighbourhood Watch Update - September 2022

Swarland / Newton on the Moor:

As of today (16/03/23), I have not received information from the police of any criminal activity in our area.

However, you might be interested in the following regarding electric scooters (Escooters). These are becoming more popular and it is important that everyone is aware of the legal requirements associated with them. Escooters are classified as Personal Light Electric Vehicles, and as such they are treated as motor vehicles and are therefore subject to the same legal requirements as other motor vehicles - viz:- they are subject to **MOT test, licensing and insurance.** Unless these requirements are met, it is illegal to use them on our region's public roads and footpaths.

Guidance was issued stating that rental companies could soon make the vehicles available to the public, in conjunction with local councils. **HOWEVER**, the use of privately bought E-scooters on the road, cycle lanes, tracks and pavements, remains **illegal**.

The police say that they do not wish for anyone to fall foul of the law, so please make sure you are aware of the rules concerning E-scooters.

Swarland Moor Local Heritage Group

We began 2023 with a talk from Sue Rogers on The Evolution of the Rights of Way Network and how missing routes can be found & retrieved for future use. Sue provided information on what clues to look for in the landscape, though did comment that getting some of these ancient rights of way recognised can take many years, so patience is needed.

This was followed by Phil Huntley who presented a summary of his research on the history of New Moor House. He talked about the Roman roads, the droving routes, coaching Inns, and the Corn Road from Hexham to Alnmouth.

The next meeting is **Tuesday 11th April** when Neil Storey will talk about **Northumberland in the Great War**. Neil is a social historian specialising in the study of the impact of war on British society in the first half of the 20th century.

On the 9th May the group will be joined by Chris Hunwick who will talk to us about the Archives of the Duke of Northumberland at Alnwick Castle. Chris has been the Duke of Northumberland's archivist for many years.

Swarland Woods: Storm Arwen Recovery work late 2023

Across Northumberland since 26th November 2021, Forestry England and its contractors has been working through its many forests to recover the woodlands and ensure safe public access. Swarland Wood is now on the list for recovery work to be undertaken this autumn. This work will include removing fallen trees and clearing conifers from one area, and in another area thinning the coniferous trees to allow the forest to become more stable and resilient for the future.

This work would normally done on a 40 to 80-year cycle across the woodland, but the storm has accelerated the speed of change in some areas, with the need for this to be carried out now. Detailed plans are still being put together. The work will start, at the earliest, in September and it is hoped that it will be on weekdays only, permitting access to the woods on the forest road at weekends. Once plans are finalised, the Parish Council will organise an open meeting, probably in June, with Forestry England which is keen to work with residents on this project. There will inevitably be disruption for forest access during the works to ensure safe working conditions, but this will also be an exciting opportunity for the local community to be involved in replanting and documenting the changes over the coming years and to take the opportunity to improve the visitor experience, one idea being to create a dark sky viewing location.

The last set of forestry works took place in Swarland Wood around 2014, felling trees for timber production, which is a key part of woodland management. Ground disturbance during work in the crop will result in increased wildflowers and ground vegetation, and vistas which have been unseen for many decades will be opened up. So, watch out over the coming months for further details!

Neighbourhood Plan

Following our articles in the last 2 editions of The Column, several people have volunteered to join a group along with some PC members, to manage the compilation of a Neighbourhood Plan. At our March meeting, the PC formally agreed to declare our parish as a Neighbourhood Plan area, and to notify NCC accordingly. This will open the door to advice from NCC planning experts, as well as to some Government funding which is administered via the charity Locality. The NP group will prepare and carry out a community engagement strategy, to seek views both on the prospective scope of the NP, as well as on the detail of policies which may be appropriate.

The NP has to be compatible with the policies in the Northumberland Local Plan, but there is potential to make more detailed provisions about future developments in, or the protection of, the villages and the open countryside in our parish. NPs have already been adopted, or are being prepared, in communities close to us including Longframlington, Alnwick / Denwick, and Felton. Nothing is ruled in or out at the moment, although the NP's drafting will need to distinguish between policies and actions which are legitimate 'planning matters', and those opportunities which will need to be pursued other than through the statutory planning process.

We hope that further details of the NP group and its programme of work will be available soon. [pto]

Road Safety

We were surprised to discover the installation of some NCC speed-measuring equipment opposite the Cook and Barker in Newton, for two reasons. It had already been agreed that the priority siting would be on the Avenue in Swarland, to determine what, if any, further traffic calming measures may be merited, following the completion of the road safety scheme at the School. Also, from past experience, there is no particular speeding problem on the old A1 in front of the Cook, and NCC had previously promised to consult us over the appropriate siting of their equipment in future.

Take action! No Mow May and beyond

Two shocking facts about the loss of wildlife in the UK:

- 1) We've lost **97%** of our wild flower meadows and pastures since the 1930s.
- 2) We are the most nature- and tree-depleted country in Europe. How shameful and embarrassing is that! Since moving to Swarland 30 years ago, we've kept records of bird sightings and insects in our garden, which show that not only the varieties, but also the numbers (except goldfinches!) have dramatically decreased, despite our garden being much richer in native and other plant species than it was. And what has happened to the Cuckoos and Grasshopper Warblers we heard every year in Swarland Woods?

But we can all help. The charity Plantlife says "simply allowing our lawns to grow through May has the potential to provide major sources of nectar for plant pollinators and to support other wildlife" (remember insects are food for many birds). Find bits of your grassy areas that you're happy to leave undisturbed throughout May (and hopefully beyond) to let varied grasses and wild flowers grow. The RHS suggests also trying different grass lengths to create varied habitats and says "Hold back the weedkiller and fertiliser . . . bringing your lawn to life!". Reframe your view of 'weeds' – they're our native wild flowers that have evolved alongside our birds and insects in a mutually supportive relationship. Dandelions, however much you recoil from them on your patch, are a vital early pollen source for bees. Don't worry about your garden being 'tidy' – that can mean 'sterile'. If you find no mowing still limits you to daisies and buttercups, but you've really got excited about it, there are good online companies that sell wildflower plug plants or better still, specialist local nurseries such as Gardener's Cottage Plants.

Taken together, our Parish has a lot of garden, land that was once natural habitat, home to populations of birds, insects, worms, small mammals and a varied plant population - until the bulldozers arrived. Let's give some of it back when it most matters. And two further top tips: Just Add Water (even a tiny pond brings benefits), and Hedges not Fences wherever possible: they provide food, shelter, nesting sites and are wildlife corridors. Enjoy your hospitable garden.

Lower Coquetdale Red Squirrels

It is thrilling to be able to report the continued presence of Red Squirrels in Swarland Wood, where there are a small number consistently visiting feeders. Dog walkers in the wood have been excited to report sightings of Red Squirrels very recently. Unfortunately, Swarland Wood along with most other places has been flooded with a wave of Grey Squirrels, which is not unusual for this time of year. Grey Squirrels carry Squirrel Pox which does not affect them, but is rapidly fatal to Reds. This time last year several Red Squirrels in Swarland Wood died from this disease.

Shockingly, we suffered the theft of two of our cameras from Swarland Wood. The cameras help us monitor the feeders, aiding in identification of Red or Grey Squirrel visitors to the feeders. Amazingly, Alncom, which has been doing local broadband work in the village, picked up on this and generously donated two replacement cameras, together with SD cards and some squirrel food, which was very gratefully received.

Some large areas of Swarland Wood, which is owned by Forestry England, are due for "clear felling" this summer. We will be following the plans for this closely in order to make sure that the endangered Red Squirrels are fully protected.

We rely on the eyes of walkers, dog walkers, cyclists, horse riders and local residents to keep us up to date with sightings of both Red and Grey Squirrels. Sightings can be reported using the "Report a Sighting" button on our website at **Icreds.org.uk**.

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Percy Wood Caravan Park - the final update?

As many of you know already, the appeal by Harrison Leisure to site caravans on the driving range was dismissed by the Inspectorate in February – the Inspector's report was comprehensive and gave several reasons for the dismissal. It was a victory for Swarland residents and we would like to thank everyone for their support throughout the whole process.

Two days later Harrison Leisure withdrew their planning application for park homes on the former Clubhouse site on Coast View – the timing was interesting

There is a further update however. We have now been reliably informed that HL is to clear away trees and site 40 caravans where the trees are now – this is on the left-hand side of the path between the golf course and the driving range, going up in the direction of the caravan park, the trees border the edge of the golf course – we believe the trees on the right-hand side have a Tree Preservation Order so they cannot be cleared. Obviously the land belongs to them and it is on their site, not quite so close to the village boundary. I have contacted NCC Planning to check and they emailed me to say they will look into it and get back to me.

At the weekend we had a visit from a representative of Arrowbuild, the company who is to build the 9 houses in the field at the end of the Springwood. They have now met all the planning conditions set out by NCC and have been given full planning permission, so they hope to start the building process within a few months. Arrowbuild is intending to hold a meeting with residents before they begin so that they can answer any queries/questions we may have.
