Sadly, The Club is no longer hosting the sale of newspapers, milk and eggs for the area.


The Post Office is still available in the Club building on Mondays and Thursdays from 8 - 10am.

NotM & Swarland Parish Council - February 2024

Finance

At our January meeting, we agreed our budget and Council Tax precept for the year, 2024-25. As we indicated previously, we have been able to 'freeze' the precept at £22,000 for a further year, which equates to a Band D-equivalent of £40 per year per household. The budget should enable us not only to meet our own operational costs, but also to continue our annual support for two village halls and Vyner Park facilities. In addition, we will continue to hold a fund to contribute to any new improvement projects within the parish.

Litter pick

The annual parish litter pick will take place on the morning of Sunday 24th March. As usual, we intend to make available basic equipment including black bin bags, protective gloves and litter-picking tools. For the Swarland area, volunteers are asked to assemble at The Square for a 10am start. Separate arrangements will be made for those covering the NotM and Hazon areas. Further details will be publicised nearer the time. Meanwhile, can we extend our thanks to Val Allport, for her sterling work in collecting litter, in all weathers and at all times of the year.

Tree felling

Residents in and around Swarland will be aware of two tree-felling operations which have been going on. The much-publicised post-Storm Arwen felling and thinning work at Forestry England's Swarland Wood is now well advanced, re-opening vistas and leaving stumps and brash; a scene which was last experienced here over 30 years ago, at the previous plantation harvesting. At the same time, work commenced within Percy Wood Country Retreat, clearing trees to make way for more permanent pitches, in its south-east area. This was a surprise to many residents. However, we understand that it is the completion of a development permitted via a planning permission of some 20 years ago.

Bits and pieces from our last meeting

Work to restore the stone seat and planter outside the school is substantially complete. Elsewhere, opposite Swarland Square, we plan to replace the seat by the bus shelter, which was installed some years ago by Swarland Village Action. At the lower part of Swarland, we are still trying to find a satisfactory location to site a new defibrillator. We are continuing to chase NCC over the improvement to the back lanes which they own, but which are not formally 'adopted' (2024 marks the 30th anniversary of their promise to adopt some of these sections). In NotM, we're still pursuing the quest for effective speed-monitoring on the main street, in order to inform the positioning of an interactive speed warning sign, which is to be funded by NCC's members small schemes budget.

Lower Coquetdale Red Squirrels - January 2024

Forestry England's felling plans continue in Swarland Wood. The clear felling is extensive, encompassing the area of the wood where the Red Squirrels were to be found. We are not able to monitor, or observe, what is happening in the main part of the wood while the felling is going on. However, a number of Red Squirrels are being fed and monitored in a small section of the wood away from the felling, which has been a joy to see. LCREDS funded the purchase of several bags of hazelnuts, which we have used to feed Red Squirrels over the winter, enabling them to cache nuts nearby. It has been rewarding to watch them on our monitoring cameras, leaving the feeder with a hazelnut, and quickly returning to collect another.

The loss of habitat from the felling does mean that Reds and Greys are now competing for food in a smaller area of woodland than before. This is a great concern, as we know that Greys have everything in their favour as regards competition for food etc. We are hoping that the felling operations will finish shortly and we will be able to put up feeders and cameras in a wider area to have a fuller picture of the situation.

Away from Swarland, there is still felling at Fram Gate, Thrunton Wood at Coe Burn and felling has started in the Callaly section (Northern Thrunton) now as well.

We continue to work hard controlling Grey Squirrels in as many areas as we can. The only way to give Red Squirrels a chance of survival is to keep the Grey population as low as possible otherwise, the Reds are driven to starvation. We are a small group of wildlife enthusiasts, dedicated to saving the Red Squirrels in our area. We are always looking for more volunteers to join us. If you think you are in a position to get involved and help save our Red Squirrels, we would very much like to hear from you.

<u>Update on Proposed Bus Service – Your Input Needed!</u>

NCC is continuing to work with bus companies to try to put the service in place. They have asked for feedback on a couple of potential changes to the timetable circulated earlier:

- 1. Instead of operating twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursdays, the bus would operate on a **Saturday** and one weekday (probably Tuesday or Thursday, but in any case, not Wednesday, so as to avoid competition with the NEED bus). Please let us know what you think about a Saturday service. Connection to and from Newcastle would still be available for this service.
- 2. The weekday service would operate in reverse to the earlier proposed timetable, resulting in a longer time in Alnwick (around 4 hours), and less time in Morpeth (around 2 hours, no connection to Newcastle). Please let us know what you think about this as well.

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The Barnes Family - end of an era

With the departure of Davey Barnes to a farming future in Scotland, comes the end of the Barnes family in Swarland - and the loss of a highly efficient and reasonably-priced car repair service!

When we moved here in 1992, we were fascinated by the military vehicles parked at the end of Home Farm Cottages. Davey's parents, Peggy and Tommy Barnes (and the boys), used to display them at various events. They owned 'the tank turns' too of course (at the junction of Park Road and Old Park Road, now a building site), where they housed their collection of various happy ducks, geese, and chickens, for a time guinea fowl, and later of course the rheas, Davey's particular interest.

Susan Richardson suggests that Peggy's father was probably a miner; came they Swarland in the 1930s after the first settlers, and initially lived in the buildings up at Swarland Hall. She isn't sure when Tommy came, but believes that he and lived Peggy in Farm Home Cottages all their

married life, producing eight children (one of whom died young). Tommy's mother was Steward at the Club, then her sister Bunty took over. He worked for Capstaff Haulage, probably as a mechanic, and at some point started Swarland Garage, which, after Tommy retired, Davey continued to run, initially with his brother Nick.

The family has been part of the history of what was a very rural Swarland Settlement, and then of the growing village.

YOUR VILLAGE SHOP – USE IT OR LOSE IT!

[and sadly in 2013 we did lose it]

Along with local post offices, they play a vital rôle in the life of villages across the District – but they are under increasing threat as more and more of us travel to supermarkets for our weekly shopping.

Local shops are especially valuable to the elderly, those with young children or without transport. They provide an excellent service, yet very few of these shops can enlarge their customer base from passing trade and only with your support can the service be retained and improved.

Alnwick District Council represents the district and contributes financially to the Vital Villages Initiatives which extends advice and financial support to shops and other rural businesses such as pubs and garages. The Council also operates a Village Shop Grant Scheme through which eligible retailers are helped to improve their premises to comply with current health and safety requirements.

How You Can Help

Buy more than the occasional or forgotten item there.

If the shop doesn't stock what you want – ask them to get it in for you.

Use services that employ others e.g. newspapers, dry cleaning, shoe repairs. Buy local produce where possible e.g. fruit, vegetables, bakery products.

Did You Know You Can Use The Post Office to:

Pay your Council Tax.

Order flowers.

Obtain commission-free foreign currency & buy travel insurance.

Open a Girobank account.

Pay bills for British Telecom, Electricity, Gas, Water, TV licence and catalogue home shopping.

Collect your pension and other benefits.

Obtain TV and Motor licence savings stamps.

Carry out personal banking – if you have an account with Barclays, Lloyds TSB, Co-op or Alliance & Leicester, you can use the Post Office free of charge for all of your personal banking.

Open National Savings accounts and bonds.
