
If You Are A Musician

Gigabit broadband

We are pleased to learn that NCC's i-Northumberland team has been working with Alncom to bring Gigabit broadband to Newton on the Moor, via Newton Hall. This comes after two wasted years in which the Government attempted to contract-out the work to a large provider, in a scheme which would have covered most of central, South and West Northumberland and County Durham. We have heard from Alncom that residents will soon be able to apply for vouchers to pay for the work, and that the first properties may be connected by about August. We will be organising a promotional event with Alncom at the Jubilee Hall. Details to be confirmed.

Litter pick

Many thanks to those who helped with the community litter-pick on 24th March. Unlike some previous years, there was no great proliferation of Jack Daniels and Listerine bottles, but a disappointing number of discarded full urinary catheter drainage bags. Clearly, someone in our area is littering the countryside with them, rather than disposing of them properly at home.

Supporting local assets

We are working closely with the two village halls to assist their improvement projects. This includes a rebuilt fireplace and window lintel at the Jubilee Hall, and the beginning of a major window-replacement scheme at Swarland VH. Both are listed buildings, which require sensitive attention to detail, and are managed by volunteer trustees. We are able to use our status as a local authority to reduce the VAT burden on these projects. We are also working with our colleagues in Felton and Thirston Parish Councils to put the management of our jointly-owned cemetery and war memorial on a more financially stable footing.

Swarland's back-roads

We had hoped to hear news at our March meeting about the future improvement and maintenance of the unadopted Settlement roads in Swarland. This year marks the 30th anniversary of undertakings by NCC Highways that the adoption of sections of Nelson Drive and Kenmore Road was imminent. We hope to report more promising news soon.

News from Swarland and Newton Action on Climate (SNAC)

We're so pleased that the new bus service running between Alnwick and Morpeth finally started at the end of March. You can find out details of the service and the story of how we got to this point elsewhere in The Column. There's also a separate copy of the timetable to keep handy. We hope to see many of you on the bus over the coming weeks and months — the more we can show that there is demand, the more likely it is we can get a weekday service too.

At our last meeting, we welcomed local farmer Judy Fortescue from Glantlees who came to talk to us about the importance of hedgerows for wildlife. Judy has kindly offered to work with SNAC as we look at ways to develop more wildlife friendly habitats around the parish (and see the separate piece on N0-mow May).

We're also about to start water quality testing on the Hazon Burn. It's part of a citizen science project organised by the Coquet River Action Group. As there's so much in the news at the moment about water pollution, we're delighted to have the opportunity to get involved.

In June we will be holding a training session with an ecologist from the Northumberland Wildlife Trust who will be teaching us how to survey the wildflower meadow in Vyner Park and learn about the maintenance of similar habitats. We haven't got an exact date for yet, but it will be in the second half of June. If you're interested in taking part, please contact Talktosnac@gmail.com.

We're always keen to welcome new members and there are lots of ways to get involved - whether that's coming along to meetings, getting involved in specific projects or receiving our monthly updates.

No-Mow May – go for it!

The awful fact: - The conservation charity Plantlife (among others) reminds us that we've lost 97% of our wildlife meadows since the 1930s, a devastating loss to the insects that depend on them for food and breeding, and to the birds that eat the insects. But we can all help to reverse this: the UK has about 23 million gardens which, if well-managed, can help recover the lost acres of wildflowers. Leaving your lawn uncut in May means that wild plants set seed before they're mown down, and get a toehold for next year.

Here in Swarland particularly, most of our gardens were meadow until relatively recently, so there's potentially a wide variety of plants lurking down there and keen to show themselves. Besides a range of **grasses**, **buttercups**, **daisies and dandelions**, you're likely to see **Bird's Foot Trefoil**, **Red and White clovers**, **Mouse-ear**, **Lady's Smock** (in damper areas), **Self-heal**, **Early Purple Orchids** and more. They're not weeds, they're our native wild flowers.

You don't have to commit your whole garden to a wilder period — just identify areas you're willing to leave untouched. But you might find you're happy to extend them next time, and even reduce your mowing throughout the summer. **The benefits to wildlife are worth the wilder appearance** — and after all, the wildlife were here before us.

Hang onto Your Hedges

Linked to No-Mow May is the idea of keeping our hedges and managing them for wildlife. Though on a small scale, **our garden hedges contribute to essential wildlife corridors** (see SNAC report above) that in the countryside are supplied by streams, woodland and (increasingly fewer) hedges. Fences are deserts, and barriers to many creatures, whereas **hedges supply food (nectar in spring and summer, berries in winter), weather protection, hiding and resting places, and nesting locations**. (They present a friendlier front to your neighbours too – we can't say hello over a 6-foot close-boarded fence.) But if you must have a fence, remember to cut holes at ground level so that hedgehogs and other ground foraging creatures can roam freely between gardens.

The Long Journey towards a Bus Service

It has now been two years since SNAC started to campaign for the return of a bus service to Swarland and Newton on the Moor. Finally, a Saturday service between Alnwick and Morpeth started on 30th March, with three journeys each way serving the two villages. It's been a long journey to get to this point and we thought it would be helpful to share some of the steps we took along the way to achieving this: SNAC conducted a survey in the Spring of 2022 to see if there was any demand for a bus. The response was overwhelmingly positive and armed with this, we approached NCC. Around the same time, Transport NE made a successful application for funding from the government's 'Bus Service Improvement Plan' (BSIP), so NCC was able to support us.

A public meeting was held in September 2022, attended by Neil Easton, NCC Public Transport Manager. It seemed that a good approach would be to utilise school buses to build a service which would run at times when the buses are not needed for school travel. (Several people have asked why the X15 Arriva bus cannot divert off the A1 as it used to; we have been told this is out of the question because of safety restrictions on larger buses turning South onto the A1 from Swarland and the tight timetabling of the Berwick to Newcastle service).

Subsequently, we surveyed residents again and concluded that a weekday service to Morpeth/Alnwick running on two days a week would suit the majority of people, and planning started.

So how did we end up with a Saturday service and why has this taken so long? Firstly, the funding didn't actually come through until the very end of the 2022-3 financial year, so nothing could happen until then. We then started to plan details of timetables and stops with officers from NCC. However, when tenders were invited from local bus companies, there were no takers. School bus contracts for September 2023 were finalised and we watched other new services funded by BSIP taking off, with no movement on our service. Finally in January, NCC started negotiating with Arriva who were able to offer the Saturday service. While we realise this may not suit everyone, we thought it important to grab this opportunity.



The service allows for a good length of time spent in either Morpeth or Alnwick in the morning, afternoon, or all day. It will also be possible to spend a few hours in Newcastle by changing buses in Morpeth. NCC will be supporting us in pushing for an additional weekday service later in the year which we hope will also be able to make a Percy Wood stop. Meanwhile, the current Saturday bus will run on a year's trial basis, so it is important that we use it as much as possible! Passenger numbers will be monitored and, please note that all concessionary passes

are accepted and that the £2 fare cap on a journey still applies.

Details of the timetable are on the insert in this issue of the Column and are also available on various noticeboards and on the SNAC website: **Bus Timetable (snac.online).** We are very grateful to NCC officers Neil Easton and Chris Curtis and Councillor Glen Sanderson for all their support with this.

Stop Press: Arriva Bus Driver Strike Action: At time of going to press, Arriva drivers had called off planned strikes for the weeks beginning Sunday 7th and Sunday 21st April. This means that the service should run on Saturdays 13th and 27th April. We will endeavour to keep you informed through Swarland Residents Facebook and noticeboards.

Lower Coquetdale Red Squirrels - March 2024

Dog walkers continue to let us know when they see squirrels, Red or Grey, in Swarland Wood. They always tell me it is the dog that spots the squirrel, even, their dog can distinguish between Red and Grey Squirrels! These reports are always appreciated, it is useful to know whereabouts in the wood squirrels are active. We know we have a very small population of Red Squirrels in Swarland Wood, boosted recently by the sighting of a kit (baby squirrel) which is very heartening.

As expected, however, following the completion of the felling operations we are aware that Reds and Greys are competing over a smaller habitat and this will be a continuing concern. In addition to the loss of habitat in Swarland Wood, residents will be aware of the felling of woodland between the caravan park and the golf course.

On the positive side, completely unexpectedly, after some years of "disinterest" from Forestry England, we received a contribution of £1000 from them to our funds. We operate on a very small budget which is usually spent on our annual insurance premium, traps, perspex for feeder fronts, disinfectant and, when we can afford it, cameras, batteries and SD cards. This donation is very gratefully received and we look forward to further collaboration with FE in future.

I should say that we do not usually have to buy feeders, as an extremely supportive villager has kept us supplied with feeders that he has made from offcuts. Again, this sort of contribution to the survival of Red Squirrels is very valuable.

We will continue to monitor feeders in the wood; now that felling is completed, we hope to be able to widen our scope to cover a larger area of what remains of the woodland. It's always helpful to receive reports of sightings of squirrels (Red or Grey) which you can do via our website (www.lcreds.org.uk) or by emailing us on sighting@lcreds.org.uk.
