

Neighbourhood Watch Update - December 2023

Swarland / Newton on the Moor:

Once again, I am happy to report that I have had no information from the police, regarding any criminal activity in our two areas.

However, here is some recent but belated news: On 18th February 2023, Victor Tuff, 62-year-old of Millcroft Court, Blyth was jailed for 5 years. He had pleaded guilty to nine offences, including possession of a firearm without certification, possession of ammunition and possession of a prohibited weapon. He was also made to forfeit all items and fined almost £200. He had previously raised suspicions when officers attended his Blyth address, following intelligence that he had attempted to import parts of a machine gun from Germany.

Sycamore Gap tree:

On Tuesday 31st October 2023, the police arrested a further two men, both in their 30s, in connection with the act of vandalism at Sycamore Gap. The police are reminding us that this is an on-going investigation, and would welcome any relevant information the public can give.

Finance

We plan to finalise our budget and Council Tax precept for 2024-25 at our January meeting. However, even allowing for inflation, the indications are that we can probably freeze the precept at its present level (ie £22,000), having reduced it from £23,000 in the previous year. This equates to a Band D equivalent figure of about £40 per household per year.

This stability is in no small part due to the great efforts of our major asset, Vyner Park, to generate income, secure grant aid, and undertake a large amount of both routine maintenance and improvement works by involving volunteers.

Our budget will allow us to continue with a Community Assets Fund, to support capital improvements to the two village halls and Vyner Park Pavilion, as well as to our smaller assets such as the bus shelters and seats.

Casual vacancy

We are seeking to fill a vacancy on our Parish Council. We therefore invite anyone who is interested, to write to us (up to 500 words) outlining why they would like to be considered. Currently, we are underrepresented by: females; the area in and around Swarland; and younger people (ie under-60-year-olds!). For more details, please contact our Clerk, Jan.

New bus service

Although the tendering process for our new bus service has so far attracted no bidders, the Parish Council and SNAC are working with NCC's public transport team to firm-up the details of the proposed route, and its signage. If all goes to plan, it will be a better service than we had originally assumed. The plan is to run a service between Alnwick and Morpeth (and back!) on both Tuesdays and Thursdays, in the off-peak period during the day. Bus stops would be outside the Cook and Barker, Jubilee Hall, Percy Wood caravan site, The Avenue (Nelson Drive road end), Swarland Square, Douglas Crescent and (if a safe stopping place can be found) Old Swarland. Continuing towards Morpeth, along the Longframlington - Felton road, the route would emerge onto the bottom of Main Street, Felton at the Running Fox, and thence on to Morpeth. Connections to Newcastle from Felton or Morpeth would also be possible.

Phones and TVs

The switch-off of 'traditional' PBX phone services, and the transfer to services via broadband (VOIP- Voice Over the Internet Protocol) is due to take place between now and 2025. This has implications for households without broadband and for those with specialist phone-linked devices such as alarms and telecare, as well as for any household experiencing a power outage. NCC has prepared a brief leaflet outlining the issues, and giving advice about sources of help.

Meanwhile, we have heard that further changes in communications services are happening soon. After March 2024, on satellite TV, the BBC will cease its SD (Standard-definition) transmissions, in favour of the newer HD. Also, during 2024 a number of mobile phone networks will be closing their 3G services, in favour of new 4G services. This will have implications for many mobile phone contracts. We understand that Vodaphone, EE and O2 will continue to provide a 2G service for older phones, for calls and texts only.

Ranting about Rivers

Thanks to everyone who came along to hear Steve Lowe from the Rivers Trust talking about the state of our local rivers and particularly the Coquet. Rivers provide a rich ecosystem and support our wellbeing in many ways – from providing drinking water to boosting resilience to climate change and giving us space to enjoy nature. Yet no rivers in England are classed as in good overall health and as Steve explained the Coquet is no exception.

SNAC is hoping to be part of a collaborative citizen science project working with other local groups and the Rivers Trust to undertake additional water quality monitoring in the Coquet and some of its important tributaries. We hope to be able to share more details of this in the new year.

Bus Service

Our mission to get a bus service continues to take a number of twists and turns. Our proposed service was finally put out to tender at the end of October – but unfortunately NCC didn't receive responses by the closing date of November 17th. However NCC is still upbeat about the service and are continuing to discuss it with a number of operators with the hope that it would be able to begin around the end of January 2024. Percy Wood Caravan Park - an update

In October, Harrison Leisure received full planning permission for the application for 14 houses on the Bari Bar site. As yet, it is unclear whether HL will sell the site to a house builder but, in a recent conversation between 2 village residents and the Percy Wood site manager, it seems likely that this will happen as HL need the revenue to finance the restaurant and splash park on their main site.

The site manager also said that the driving range shelter has to be rebuilt to its former state (stipulated by the insurance company) but HL is considering creating a dog run area and a space for football nets etc on the actual driving range itself. Building materials have appeared near the remains of the shelter but work has not yet started.

Residents may be aware that trees are being felled on the caravan park (to the left of the path which leads up to the site past the driving range) – chainsaws have been heard for 4 weeks now – and we have been informed that a large area of beech trees has been cleared. One of the Parish Councillors and I have contacted NCC Planning, NCC Enforcement and the Forestry Commission (they are responsible for the felling of trees) as a significant number of healthy trees have been removed.

At the time of writing this article, investigations are continuing, to establish whether this work is being carried out under an old planning permission and the Caravan Site Licence from the late 1980s/early 1990s, or whether a new application would be needed.

Lower Coquetdale Red Squirrels (LCRS)

Forestry England (FE or old Forestry Commission) began felling operations in Swarland Wood on the 26th October. The works will pick up the fallen trees from Storm Arwen, clear fell a large area of the wood and thin out the remaining wood towards the North of the plantation. We're very concerned about the impact this will have on the Red Squirrel colony here. It is a small habitat area for them as it is, so with it being greatly reduced the chances of the Reds surviving after the forestry operations are likely to be very low.

Historically, FE hasn't engaged with Red Squirrel conservation efforts. Earlier this year, for the first time, it indicated that it was going to take an interest. Following our questioning of their staff about the survival of Reds in Swarland Wood, we were invited to identify and mark drey (nest) trees prior to the felling works. The dreys we marked were in the area to be thinned, the idea being that the marked trees will be left standing to give the Reds a chance of survival. We've also been feeding the Reds hazelnuts. They can cache these and we're hoping that they will provide them with important additional nutrition to help them survive. We have Reds on our trail camera videos, going back and forth collecting hazelnuts, so we are hopeful that it will help. Hazelnuts are extremely expensive, so we asked FE if it would like to help us buy them, but sadly got a negative response.

Many people believe that Reds prefer conifer woodland, but this isn't exactly true. Deciduous woodland, such as hazel, beech, oak etc. create large seeds and these provide a lot of food compared to the tiny seeds from a conifer. Both Reds and Greys prefer the best supply of food, but the American Greys are far bigger and bully the Reds out of these woods. Food is scarce in conifer plantations and so they are the last type of woodland that Greys take over, giving a last refuge for the Reds. Unfortunately, there is a lot of felling currently underway near us, such as Thrunton, Rimside Moor, Fram Gate and Edlingham, all of which have Red Squirrels populations.
