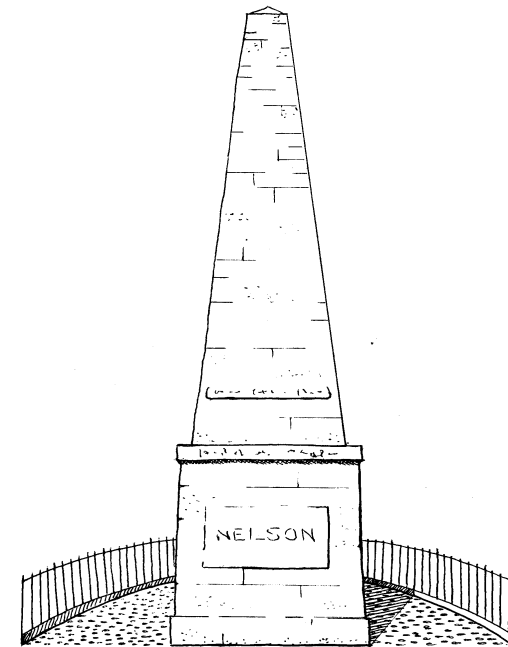

Gigabit broadband

Following the news reported in the last edition of The Column, Alncom is moving ahead to bring gigabit broadband into Newton on the Moor. It has already contacted those households who signed-up for the voucher scheme several years ago, to check they are happy to renew their applications. We will be organising a promotional event with Alncom at the Jubilee Hall. Details to be confirmed.

Supporting local assets

In the last edition, we reported on our continuing support for the two village halls in our parish. Swarland Village Hall is now preparing for a massive improvement project next year, to replace all of the windows with new double-glazing. There are a lot of windows, and they are all high up in the structure. Also, the Hall is a listed building, so formal consent is required from the County Council (NCC), which will almost certainly require the replacements to be custom-made wooden frames. The cost could be in the region of £80k. We, in the Parish Council, intend to provide financial support, and we are thinking of a grant of possibly £10k. This will not need to be made available until 2025, and so we will need to factor it into our council tax precept decision in about 6 months' time. Meanwhile, the SVH committee is working hard to prepare applications for grants from numerous additional sources, and to undertake further fund-raising events.

Finances

We finalised our accounts for 2023-24 in May and made them available for public inspection, prior to the statutory audit. Our income was £24,651, and our expenditure was £23,459. These figures also include the work on the Neighbourhood Plan and climate change (SNAC), along with our contribution to the Cemetery Joint Committee. The Vyner Park charity's accounts are compiled separately. At the year-end, we increased our designated Community Assets Fund balance to £15,000, to assist with future projects.

Highway improvements

NCC has contacted all Parish and Town Councils, asking for their top 3 suggestions for highway improvements within their area for possible inclusion in the 2025-26 Local Transport Plan. We will continue to prioritise and push for the improvement and maintenance of the unadopted Settlement roads in Swarland, on which NCC is currently undertaking some further work on the details. In addition, we will be happy to receive and consider further suggestions from local residents in our parish, preferably by early September. NCC uses a list of detailed criteria to judge all proposals, and there is no guarantee that whatever we put forward for the LTP will be accepted.

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Casual vacancy

We are still seeking to fill a vacancy on our Parish Council. We therefore invite anyone who is interested to write to us (up to 500 words), outlining why they would like to be considered. Currently, we are under-represented by: females; the area in and around Swarland; and younger people (i.e. under-60-year-olds). Arthur Scott, 1923 – 2024

Many of us have been saddened to learn of the death, on 15th July, of Arthur Scott, who became Swarland's first (well-known) centenarian on 8th October last year.

Born in Shilbottle, Arthur moved here with his parents in 1930, when they lived in a flat in Swarland Hall. Having attended school in Newton on the Moor, he found his permanent employment with the former Forestry Commission, and over the following decades he became familiar with most of their woods in Northumberland. This was the start of his building up the great knowledge of trees, plant life, birds and animals for which he was well known, and which he was always willing to share with anyone who asked.

In 1953, Arthur married Dorrie, a Settler's daughter, and soon they moved into Swarland Hall Cottage, where he lived until he was admitted to hospital four weeks before his death.

Arthur and Dorrie had two daughters and they and their new families remained close and very caring, especially after his wife died in 2007.

On the occasion of attaining his century, he was well and active enough to receive the many people who attended his birthday party in the Village Hall, and to plant the Sweet Chestnut tree presented by the Parish Council. He also planted a tree in Kielder, and fired the signal to begin the Kielder Marathon, and he was publicly congratulated by the Chief Executive of Forest England, who travelled north for the ceremony as Arthur was one of the longest serving members of its staff.

Arthur was also a great gardener, and answer to mole invasion, and the only life member of our Local Heritage Group, where he was often called upon to settle a neighbourhood question.

He was an enthusiastic entrant – and winner – in Swarland (now Swarland and NotM) Show since its re-emergence in 1995 and he provided the A. & D. Scott Salver for the event.

Swarland has now lost a loved and highly respected member of its community, which undoubtedly will be the poorer for his absence. But his memory will live on amongst his many friends who will miss him. As will the Red Squirrels which he worked so hard to protect from his cottage in the wood.

Bus Service Update

The Saturday bus service has now been running for nearly four months. It's a great way to spend a few hours in either Alnwick or Morpeth – or use it to go further afield. We've been told that NCC is considering some changes to the timetable which it thinks may make the service more sustainable. We don't have full details yet, but it would be likely that the amount of time in Alnwick was increased and the time in Morpeth decreased. Travelling through to Newcastle should remain possible, with a later arrival there in the morning and an earlier departure at the end of the afternoon. Any changes wouldn't come into effect until October, but we really need to know what you think of the current service and the possible changes. Neighbourhood Plan Update

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group wish to thank everyone who responded to our request for comments on the draft Design Code during the informal consultation that ended on 10th June 2024. Those comments have assisted in the preparation of a communication with the Design Code Consultants, AECOM, that summarises all previous requests for changes to the document and the other matters subsequently identified as a result of the informal consultation.

As mentioned in the June Column, the Steering Group has had assistance from Rob Naples and Mark Harrison from NCC, and this has been invaluable. It is pleasing to report that their comments about our draft Plan have been very positive. They have been very pleased to see that the draft Plan has clearly been written by local people with knowledge of the Parish and is thus authentic. Indeed, they said that our draft Plan has 'more original content' than any plan that they have read in Northumberland.

We are currently awaiting funding to enable AECOM to make the amendments to the Design Code that we seek. Once that comes through and the Design Code has been amended then we will be able to complete the draft Plan.

When the draft Plan has been finalised, we are required by Regulation 14 of the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations (2012) (as amended) to conduct a formal consultation with residents, businesses and statutory and other bodies, that will last 6 weeks. The Plan and its supporting documents will be made available for this purpose on the Parish Council website and printed copies of the Plan will be made available to view at: The Jubilee Hall, Newton on the Moor; Swarland Village Hall; Nelson's at the Park. Following this stage of consultation, all comments received will be taken into consideration and the Plan may then be revised to take account of these.

We are proposing to hold at least two drop-in events during the consultation period to enable people to ask questions of the Steering Group about the draft Plan.

This will be another opportunity for you all to have your say.

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Lower Coquetdale Red Squirrels – July 2024

We are thrilled to have received a grant from The Ridley Family Charity towards buying new equipment and food for our latest three active group members. This equipment will help us greatly in our Red Squirrel conservation work. We are extremely grateful to The Ridley Family Charity trustees in supporting us in our efforts to save the Red Squirrels in the Lower Coquet Valley.

On 1st June, we held a public meeting in Swarland Village Hall to inform residents of the perilous situation of the Red Squirrels in Swarland Wood. We were lucky enough to recruit several new volunteers and this has enabled us to monitor the wood twice daily to remove Grey Squirrels. The extra equipment, and increased workforce, will help a great deal towards keeping our local reds alive. It is, however, still a tough, uphill struggle.
